#### **POLICY UPDATES**

#### **ILE Requirement Waivers**

Rising seniors whose plans for a summer internship have been disrupted by Covid-19 may petition the Academic Standards & Discipline Committee to waive the ILE requirement. In many cases, it will be best to seek a fall or spring internship instead – rising seniors should discuss this possibility with their academic adviser and the CPD. Petitions should be sent to Kelly Sorensen (ksorensen@ursinus.edu). Students granted a waiver may be required to enroll in a one-credit Spring 2021 course about career and post-graduate development.

#### **Faculty Evaluation**

## S/U Grading Option for Spring 2020

As a reminder, students have until 11:59pm on Wednesday, April 29 to complete the S/U grading opt-in form for this semester. Students may choose to take S/U grades for any or all of this semester's courses. The grade of S should be awarded for any passing work (D- or better). Please maintain normal grading records for your students until the submission of final grades, as we will need to track students for whom an S grade reflects work that would have ordinarily earned a grade below C. #### **Transfer Credit Policy**

In light of Covid-19, current students may transfer back to Ursinus up to two online courses that are completed during the spring and summer of 2020. These spring and summer online courses may be in addition to the standard cap of two courses (no more than 8 credits) for transferring online courses from previous or future periods. Other standard requirements apply: the final grade must be a C or better, the course must be consonant with the rigor and content of courses offered at Ursinus, etc. Students should first complete the Study Elsewhere Form.

### Celebration of Scholarship, Creativity, and Achievement

This year, in lieu of the annual celebration of scholarship and creative work, Academic Affairs will partner with College Communications to celebrate the work of faculty and students on-line. We ask you to submit a visual representation of work you may have published, performed, or exhibited this year. Examples: book covers and abstracts; journal articles (linkable pdf's desired; please include a one-to-two-sentence summary if possible); clips or images of performances or artworks. The virtual celebration will link to the Commencement page as well as academic affairs. We are eager to highlight your work; please send materials or queries by **May 1**. If your current work is already on the digital commons, please let us know and we can link to that too!

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#### **Faculty Good News**

Teresa Ko, Associate Professor of Modern Languages (Spanish) and Latin American Studies Coordinators, has been awarded a highly prestigious fellowship from the American Council of Learned Societies and another one from the Mellon-funded Inclusion Imperative Fellowship at the University of Maryland-Baltimore County. Ko will be engaged in writing and revision of her book manuscript, *Argentina: Race in a Raceless Nation*. Tony Lobo (Biology) and Mark Ellison (Chemistry), along with several student co-authors, recently had a paper accepted for publication focusing on antibiotic resistance. Rich Wallace (Environmental Studies) and Jess Greenburg '21 undertook a Summer Fellows project last summer focused on reducing student anxiety and despair. This work has now been published and focuses mainly on environmental studies, but provides lessons that are now more broadly applicable.

#### **Promotion to Full Professor**

All tenured faculty in their fourth year or later after the receipt of tenure are eligible to apply for promotion to full professor. Faculty who intend to come up for promotion in 2021 are asked to submit a list of four external reviewers, including names, institutional information, phone and email address, and personal or professional relationship, if any, by June 15, 2020 to <a href="mailto:deansoffice@ursinus.edu">deansoffice@ursinus.edu</a>. Sample self-evaluations from recently promoted full professors are available in Grizzly Gateway in Evaluation Resources, under Dean's Office Resources. The final deadline for small research grants for the year will be June 1, 2020. Funds of up to \$1000 may be requested to defray expenses related to publication.
