

Centered on the theme of "His Words Still Speak," we paid particular attention to his speeches and writings, asking campus constituents and community partners who participated in our week-long programs to reflect on a quote that inspired them both personally and professionally.

In addition to service opportunities at the top of the week, we used the traditional day of service to engage in learning and conversations with local non-profit organizations. The rest of the week included a stimulating discussion at the Berman regarding Labor Movements in Museums; lightning talks from faculty, staff, and students; a showing of the movie "Till" and a "Conversations" lunch dedicated to the film. On Saturday, our friends in athletics dedicated a basketball doubleheader to Dr. King. Finally, Sunday found us at the Community Interfaith Service in Bomberger. Crossroads Mentoring Program

Calling all Sophomores! We recently launched a pilot program that provides an opportunity for sophomores to be paired with a faculty or staff mentor. Mentors and mentees will meet bi-weekly for conversations. Participating students can use these meetings as an opportunity to set goals, learn about resources, and build a network across campus.

Community Cooperation Program (CCP)

Students interested in connecting with community leaders to learn more about their work are invited to do so through the Community Cooperation Program. The best part is that you don't have to make a long-term commitment. You can meet with a community partner for one, two, or three or more times. It's entirely up to you. Our community leaders represent a number of industries and organizations, education, small businesses, elected representatives, and more. The CCP is a partnership with Career and Post-Graduate Development (CPD), so reach out to our friends in CPD if you want to get connected.

Welcome Home Project

If you haven't heard about the Welcome Home Project, then it's new to you. Just over 18 months ago, the college was fortunate to forge a partnership with the Lenape people, particularly the Delaware Tribe of Indians from Bartlesville, Oklahoma. This relationship led to the adoption of a Land Acknowledgement Statement, and a Statement of Mutual Intentions, which outlines a basic plan for our work together. The progress we've made to date has been guided by the Delaware Tribe of Indians, and we're also grateful to students, faculty, and staff, in Environmental Studies, History, the Office of Sustainability, and Myrin Library for their tireless dedication to this work. We are also grateful to our partners from the Perkiomen Valley School District, and the larger community who allowed us to participate in this journey with them.
